Permanent Water Restrictions on the Horizon

Governor Brown signed into law in July that starting in 2022, we will be restricted to 55 gallons of water per person per day per household for indoor water usage.

What this means is if there are two people living in a home, they will only be allowed to use 110 gallons of water for drinking, cooking, taking showers, doing laundry or any other indoor use.

In July of this year the average usage per person in Leavitt Lake was 173 gallons per day.

We have not had restrictions this year and it clearly shows in the high usage. In July of 2018 the district used 1.5 million gallons MORE than in July of 2017!

We have had water running in some gutters and some people leaving their water on for days. This is wasting water.

The state is saying that if their new goals are not met that the water providers will receive hefty penalties.

and if this were to happen because our residents would not adhere to the restrictions, then we would have to pass that cost on to our customers via rate hikes.

As we learn more about this new law we will pass the information on to you.

We have about 4 years to change the way we use water. Start now and conserve.

Reminders!

Our board meetings are held the third Tuesday of each month at 4:00 PM in the District office. We encourage everyone to attend our meetings in order to stay informed about what's going on in our community.

Your bills are always due by the 18th of each month. Late notices are mailed on the morning of the 19th. The District operates mainly on the revenue received from its customers. So it is important that bills be paid on time.

Although there are no water restrictions in our District, you still cannot waste water. You still cannot have water running in the gutters nor can you leave your water running for long periods of time.

Election time is nearing again. Remember to take the time to become informed about the candidates. Ask questions about them. Why are they running for office? Are they honest? Have they carried through with promises made? What have they done for our county/community? But most of all, REMEMBER TO VOTE
