To Prevent clogs, backups and costly plumbing repairs, please follow these simple guidelines:

✓ Safe to Flush

Human waste

Toilet paper only!

✗ Do NOT Flush

Wipes (including “flushable” wipes)

Paper towels or tissues

Feminine hygiene products

Diapers

Cotton products

Dental floss

Cat litter

✗ Keep Out of Drains:

Grease, fats, and oils

Food scraps

Coffee grounds

Paint, chemicals, or medications

Items that do not break down properly can cause sewer backups, property damage, and costly system repairs.

Did You Know?

A leaking toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water per day?

That’s thousands of gallons per month – and you may not even hear it running! Try placing a few drops of food coloring in your toilet tank. If color appears in the bowl after 10–15 minutes (without flushing), you likely have a leak.



🕒 Daylight Saving Time Begins

It’s time to “Spring Forward” one hour! As you set your clocks ahead, take a few minutes to protect your home and conserve water:

◆ Adjust Irrigation Timers

Longer daylight doesn’t always mean your lawn needs more water. Start the season slowly and increase watering only as temperatures rise.

◆ Check for Winter Damage

Inspect outdoor faucets, irrigation lines, and exposed pipes for cracks or leaks that may have occurred during colder months.

◆ Look for Hidden Leaks

Check under sinks, around hose bibs, and inside your toilet tank to catch small leaks before they become costly.

◆ Test Smoke & Carbon Monoxide Detectors

A quick battery check keeps your household safe.

Seasonal reminders like this help conserve water, protect your plumbing, and keep our community system running smoothly.
